#### **Explanations:**

PSDA - Professional Skill Development Activities

After 4<sup>th</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> Semester, students have to undergo a Compulsory Summer Internship for one month and on that a report has to be submitted by each student separately. - a. Moot Court Every student may be required to do at least three moot courts in a year with 10 marks for each. The moot court work will be on assigned problem and it will be evaluated for 5 marks for written submissions and 5 marks for oral advocacy.
- b. Observance of Trial in two cases, one Civil and one Criminal.

Students may be required to attend two trials in the course of the last two or three years of BALLB studies. They will maintain a record and enter the various steps observed during their attendance on different days in the court assignment.

(c) Interviewing techniques and Pre-trial preparations and Internship dairy.

Each student will observe two interviewing sessions of clients at the Lawyer's Office/ Legal Aid Office and record the proceedings in a diary. Each student will further observe the preparation of documents and court papers by the Advocate and the procedure for the filing of the suit/ petition. This will be recorded in the dairy.

(d) The fourth component of this will be Viva Voce examination on all the above three aspects. The Court work shall be submitted by Student in own handwriting in the College/SOS in Law. The evaluation shall be made by the college/SOS in Law on the basis of participation and record. The college/SOS in Law after valuation shall sent the diaries and marks to the University. The Principal/ Head may himself evaluate and allot marks on the record or authorize any senior members of the staff, for this purpose. In the later case the Principal/Head shall countersign on the awarded marks.
